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
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
Theodore Rosciele Theodore Roosevelt Jr. (1858–1919) Seated in back seat behind Ransom Olds. Roosevelt was a writer, naturalist, soldier and the 26th President of the United States. Bro. Roosevelt was a member of Matinecock Masonic Lodge No. 806, Oyster Bay, New York.




Jonathan L. Snyder (1859–1918) In the back seat next to President Roosevelt. Snyder was president of Michigan Agricultural College (later Michigan State University) from 1896 to 1915. Bro. Snyder was a charter member of **East Lansing Masonic** Lodge No. 480.



William Loeb Jr. (1866-1937) Seated next to Ransom Olds. Loeb was the first White House Press Secretary. Bro. William Loeb, Jr. 33° was a member of Matinecock Masonic Lodge No. 806. Loeb participated in Teddy's Fellow Craft degree and coached him in his proficiency through all three degrees.

Josephine Bake (1906 - 1975)

World-renowned actress and dancer, who advocated for social change. She grew up in St. Louis and got her big break in vaudeville theater while on tour in Paris.

When World War II began in 1939, because of her fame and social contacts, Baker was recruited by the French Resistance to gather

intelligence. She was able to spy on the Nazi forces and smuggled notes in invisible ink to help liberated France..

Josephine Baker was awarded the Croix de Guerre by the French military and was made a Chevalier of the Legion D'Honneur by Charles De Gaulle.



Inspired by the ideals of Liberty, Equality and Fraternity – values of French culture and reflected in Freemasonry,

Josephine Baker became a Freemason in 1960.

She was initiated into La Nouvelle Jérusalem Lodge in Paris, part of the Grande Loge Féminine de France. This lodge was part of the French "Rite of Adoption", allowing women to become Masons.

A lifelong supporter of the Civil Right movement, Josephine Baker was the only female invited to speak at the Martin Luther King March on Washington.



Fashion and fashionable automobiles were part of Josephine Baker's lifestyle. She is pictured stepping out of her Delage D8-85, with a custom body designed by Letourneur & Marchand while she wore a matching outfit with black and white feather collar – c'est magnifique!


William Claude Dukenfield

Clark Gable (1901 - 1960) Academy Award winning actor for 30 years in more than 60 films. Member of


