mind of prehistoric man.

So, way before the PBS series "Antiques Roadshow", aired on television, humans have searched for rare and beautiful objects as well as items of historic value and assembled them for personal or public display.

The genesis of the Grace Dee May Museum began with a young girl's fascination with buttons. When Audrey Marie Stein, the GDM's Director Emeritus, was growing up in rural Kansas, she began collecting buttons. Prior to recent decades, homemade clothing was the norm and many of us can still remember our mother's or grandmother's prized "button box".

As a child, Audrey was fascinated with both the decorative and functionality of unique vintage buttons. Her original button collection remains a part of our Museum's collections of Americana. Throughout her life, Audrey expanded her horizons as a collector from buttons to a significant collection of French bronzes, Western art, Masonic artifacts and historical documents and so much more. As a professor, Audrey's vision and dedication to sharing knowledge guided her ambition to found the Grace Dee May Museum.


